Anne was an impressive womanizer who was quite out and proud in the first half of the 19th century. She was into knowledge, a passionate reader - English, Greek, Latin - as well as committed to leading a self-determined life. She was a strategist in the pursuit of an independent life under a difficult regime of gender and space. Against the rules for middle/upper class women she literally walks on her own in the tradition of (male) intellectuals and writers of her time.	Hannah passionately worked her whole life in service to stay her own woman. She was intellectually critical and clear on gender class power relations. Consequent in her decisions and actions to protect carved out material and immaterial spaces of independence within the total institution of the Victorian household, in her dedicated 24/7 Ms relationship with an upper-middle class man, and in her marriage to this man. clear and critical.	Emily was a creative force. She was many things, had many talents. Dedicated to education. a passionate reader - in english, greek, latin. She was a Romantic, an animal & nature lover. she considered herself part of it. It was where her inspirations came from. Working at home as housekeeper. She was a fighter and a good shot. Charlotte Brontë says about Emily's writing: "we seem at times to breathe lightning".
Anne suggests to the psychiatrist Dr. Belcombe to declare her first lover Eliza Raine - a woman of colour - "insane". As Anne feared that Eliza, who was already locked up in the doctor's asylum, might speak out about their former relationship, that then her words would bear less weight. Dr. Belcombe refused.	We don't know of bad stuff up to now.	For again breaking the rules and lying on one of the best beds Emily punches their bull dog Keeper with her fists in his face, so his eyes are swollen closed.

She teaches briefly. She does a lot of house and needle work at home.

Aristocrat with material & social family privileges - access complicated and limited because of gender, receiving material and immaterial benefits through relations with wealthier female lovers - esp. in her last years a lot of money from her partner Ann Walker	Earning her own money throughout her life - starting at the age of 8, insisting on working and being paid still after her marriage with her considerably wealthy partner, master and employer - his wealth extending Hannah's possibilities: e.g. health care, going places	Coming from rather poor circumstances, she only had a secure home as long as her father was alive and pastor. She briefly worked as a governess & teacher but couldn't bear it. Publishing literature was also related to the hope of earning an income, though Emily wrote all her life.
Looking out for herself, being very strategic, being educated, walking her path, being strong willed	Very strong laborer, well able to protect herself also physically, financially independent, insisting on staying a paid worker even when working in her husband's household, being strong willed	Creating stories and plays, writing books, avoiding society, living with animals and with nature, being strong willed

<p>Anne Lister had many, many lovers - often several affairs at the same time. She had passionate as well as strategic relationships that lasted over many years. Sex played a big role in her life which one understands by reading her frank as well as detailed diary entries. Her most important relationships might have been with Eliza Raine, Isabella 'Tib' Norcliffe, Mariana Belcombe and Ann Walker. From 1834 till her death in 1840 she was 'married' to her wealthy neighbour Ann Walker who enabled many of her quests with her monex. Even the relationship was again and again strained heavily Anne Lister and Ann stayed together till the end of Anne Lister's life.</p>	<p>Self-identified 24/7 Master/slave relationship for 54 years with one person: Arthur Munby, whom Hannah called 'Massa' and who was an upper middle class man deeply into working class women. First they shared 18 years of secret relationship that happened in a clear structural frame and seems seriously kinky. It was continued throughout their 37 year long secret marriage. Throughout their relationship Hannah worked in different places as a servant while they maintained their relationship through visits, correspondence as well as Hannah's diary of her everyday work life.</p>	<p>The most important relationships of Emily Brontë - also in relation to her creative process and production - were with her 3 siblings Charlotte, Anne &amp; Branwell. Her mother died when she was still an infant, followed by her two older sisters Elisabeth &amp; Mary dying within an infamous boarding school and then the death of her aunt and caretaker. Only a few months prior to her own death her brother Branwell died. A positive constant and much liked human was Tabby, their housekeeper. Other than that she had an intense relation to certain animals, very much their dog Keeper, and nature, especially the Yorkshire moors.</p>

<p>Anne had a few brothers that all died before the age of 20, the only one she had a close relationship to was Samuel. She had a little sister Marian that lived longer than Anne. Her mum died when she was 26 and I'm a bit confused about the dad because he lived until 1836. Ann never married a man. She was committed to her partner Ann Walker in some sort of ceremony.</p>	<p>Close to her sisters and her brother as well as her mother. And to Arthur Munby for 55 years</p>	<p>Emily never married, she lived with her siblings and with her father for the most part of her life. Very close relations with her siblings. A lot of people close to her died early on: her mother, then the two eldest siblings in cruel infamous boarding school, then her aunt who was taking on care work after her mother died, then her brother.</p>
